Introduction

The MSc/Graduate Diploma is designed to offer graduates the opportunity to study some of the core topical, theoretical and methodological Digital Policy issues arising today. We situate concepts in perspectives such as platform capitalism and governance, data infrastructures, information analytics, interface critique, privacy and data processing, online safety and cybersecurity, child protection online and AI regulation, welcoming a series of industry-based stakeholders and professional speakers on these topics.

Digital policy issues include investigating the institutional and public policy dimensions of the prevalence of digital technologies,

digital infrastructure, and data processing in all dimensions of life. This programme allows students to study the underlying social conditions (economic, political, and culture) that give rise to and influence such technologies and their governance, as well as the multiple public sector and commercial contexts where policy is made and enacted.

Taking an interdisciplinary approach, our innovative programme mixes theoretical and applied methods. We introduce basic concepts and issues in digital policy, providing historical, contextual, regulatory and critical knowledge on how to theorise digital technologies and environments.

Programme Highlight

With support from Microsoft Ireland, UCD's School of Information and Communication studies presents the Microsoft-UCD Digital Policy Programme with the goal of building digital policy training and capability.

The proposed Graduate Diploma/ MSc course, in addition to related initiatives, builds on existing expertise and infrastructure across government, industry, civil society and academia to address the increased demand for digital policy knowledge and skills.

Career Opportunities

Our MSc degree and Graduate Diploma aims to produce future professionals with a deep understanding of both theoretical and applied issues in digital policy. On graduating, our students will be able to embark on a variety of careers in IT and the Tech industry, government and civil society roles and non-governmental organisations in Ireland, the EU and globally. The degree paves the way towards a PhD in this area or careers in government, civil society and tech industry. We also encourage and help our students to turn their theses into publications.

Our Digital Policy programme is designed to prepare graduates for careers in evaluating, implementing, and studying core topical, theoretical, and methodological issues that arise in digital policy today.

Applicant Requirements

- Applicants should present with a primary (bachelor's) degree in any subject with an overall score of 2.1 or higher.
- Names and contact details of two referees who can assess their intellectual ability, maturity and motivation.
- Applicants whose first language is not English must also demonstrate English language proficiency of IELTS 6.5 (no band less than 6.0 in each element), or Equivalent.
- While applications are accepted up to August of the year of entry, offers are made to suitably qualified candidates on a first-come-first-served basis. Early application is recommended as entry to the programmes is very competitive and the number of places is limited.
